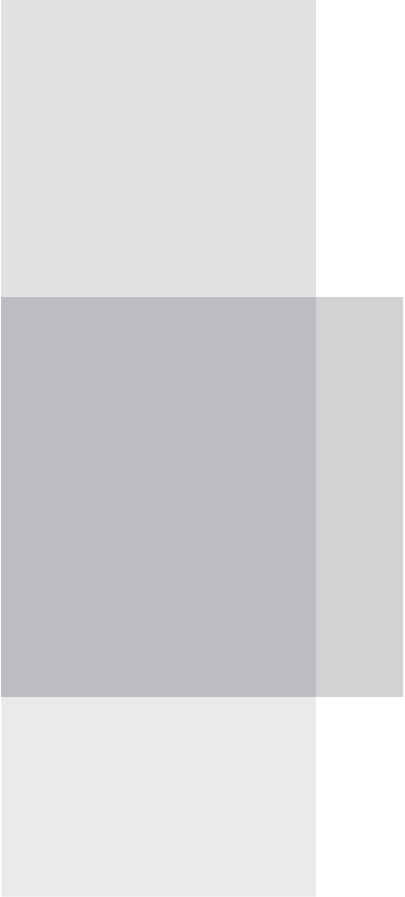

Our Vision

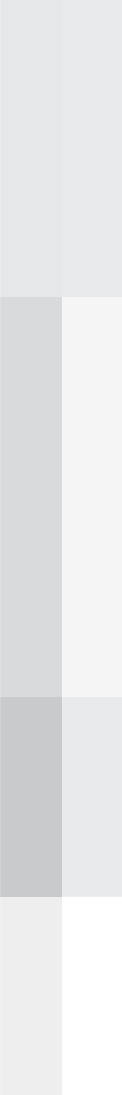
The University of Saskatchewan Students’ Union strives to be the recognized leader in enhancing the student experience.

General Manager's Message

On behalf of the professional staff of the USSU, I am very pleased again this year to present our annual report.

2017-2018 was a particularly busy year for the organization in the realm of facilities upgrades, especially in our first space, the Memorial Union Building. In early May of 2017, we closed Louis' and undertook a major refresh over the next five weeks. This encompassed a new moving wall, new stage, two new bars, new lighting, a new fireplace, and new furniture throughout. We emerged from this work with a refurbished Louis' that has a coherent look and feel and one that is more inviting and welcoming for students and other guests, as well as for special events. In December of 2017, we then moved to the main floor of MUB and the two stairwells, removing the old flooring, repairing water damaged walls and ceilings, and replacing the Memorial Fireplace insert. The entire building now has an entirely different feel to it, and we accomplished this while maintaining the unique heritage quality of this very special environment. Finally, we removed the 40 year old concrete seats from Place Riel and replaced them with an entirely different form of modular furniture and added in a number of both high and low tables and workbenches designed for both independent and cooperative work. All projects came in under budget and on time and we believe will enhance the student experience on our campus for many years to come.

As we were working on these projects, we were also busy maintaining existing services to students. U-Pass continues to have an exceptional uptake and at a 75% discounted rate is a huge boon to students needing an inexpensive and accessible way of commuting to and from campus. We have been working closely with Saskatoon Transit on a new iteration of the pass itself, as well as having significant involvement on the on-going plans to change Transit's infrastructure and speed of service within the city. Overall responsibility for this program resides with the Vice President Operations and Finance.

The second largest program offered by the USSU is the health and dental program, brokered by Studentcare. The USSU has had a health and dental program for more than two decades, and it fills in the gap for students between what is provided by the government and what they must pay for themselves. Offering support for medication, vision care, dental check-ups, cleanings, and routine services, chiropractic, physiotherapy, and mental health specialists, the program allows students who are supported by another plan to opt out while ensuring that all others have the advantage of being covered. This program exists under the office of Vice President Student Affairs.

Most importantly the USSU continued to offer a significant number of very high-quality services, programs, host events, and support student-led initiatives. This year food security was identified as a substantial issue and barrier to success, and so we have increased our attention to providing additional emergency food, in part at least thanks to a grant from the university's Parking Services Department. We also continue to raise awareness about community issues by promoting diversity and organizing educational events and programming provided by the Women's Centre, Pride Centre, Help Centre, Student Crew and Safewalk. Our highly successful Welcome Week continues to kick off the year on a positive note and remains the most anticipated event on campus.

Our operations continued to embrace best practice and remain as nimble and adaptable as possible in the face of changing demographics, financial, and innovative realities. It is a great team to lead, and I continue to be enormously proud of the way in which all our staff shows up every day to serve undergraduate students at the University of Saskatchewan.

USSU Operations

Louis’

Louis’ continued to be the primary gathering place on campus for students to eat, drink, and see live music over the past year. Louis’ served thousands of students, staff, and faculty, from a diverse menu during busy lunch rushes, and dinners. Nightly promotions and weekly events also continued to be well attended.

Louis’ remains proud of the many sustainable facets of the operation. They exclusively feature eighteen draught beers from Saskatchewan brewers. Louis’ also features locally produced spirits, uses only compostable takeout containers and cutlery, and composts all coffee grounds. The operation was awarded a provincial sustainability award for all of their efforts throughout the year.

Despite declining revenues in the food and beverage industry, Louis’ was encouraged by the rise in special events bookings. Louis’ hosted hundreds of special events throughout the year including student functions, weddings, banquets, and concerts.

Louis’ also worked hard to grow business outside of the Memorial Union Building with numerous catered event orders across campus. Louis’ also continued to provide food and beverage services at Griffiths Stadium for events ranging from Huskie Football and soccer, to track and field meets.

Louis’ Loft

Louis’ Loft remained a trendy destination for students and special event clients over the past year. The operation continues to be a busy coffee shop during the day featuring equitably sourced coffee and teas, nitro coffee, and a wide variety of specialty coffees, all from local suppliers. In addition to coffee, Louis’ Loft offers local draught beers, and spirits as well as wines. Louis’ Loft food menu continued to evolve with a variety of premium paninis, sandwiches, salads, baked goods, and snacks.

As a special event venue, Louis’ Loft continued to see demand grow for the welcoming space. Student groups, campus departments, weddings, and othes booked the Loft space for their special events, banquets, and functions throughout the year

XL Print & Design

XL Print & Design continued to thrive in its location on the main floor of Place Riel with sales growing despite sweeping changes to the campus print environment. The operation increased its list of clients and expanded their services even further. The staff worked diligently to produce high-quality work with industry-leading turnaround times for their customers.

XL Print & Design continues to offer wide format printing, colour copying, and graphic design to hundreds of clients. They carry various types of media such as matte paper, photo gloss, vinyl, canvas, and sticker paper. They also offer finishing services such as mounting, laminating, and binding to their clients.

Information Centre

The Information Centre, located in Upper Place Riel continues to be the first stop for students and visitors to campus. Whether it is for transit information or directions the Information Centre is an integral part of the University of Saskatchewan Students’ Union and is a highly utilized service that attracts thousands of customers per year.

The Information Centre is proud to offer U-PASS (universal transit pass) for both undergraduate and graduate students, table and kiosk rentals, campus directory, faxing, lost and found, Notary and Commissioner of Oaths services, locker rentals, printing credit, evening parking passes, and general information.

USSU Centres

The University of Saskatchewan Students' Union operates a number of centres aimed at enhancing the student experience. The USSU centres are open to all students and provide resources, support, and services in a warm, positive atmosphere.

Food Centre

The Food Centre works to educate students about healthy food choices and strives to aid students with food security issues. The centre provides emergency food hampers to students in need, and the CHEP Good Food Box to the campus community. Emergency food hampers are provided to students from the Saskatoon Food Bank. Students need a valid Saskatchewan health card and university student card to access this service. The CHEP Good Food Boxes, offered by the centre, provides top-quality, fresh, nutritious food at an affordable price. Subscribers place their orders every second Monday for pick up on Wednesdays.

The Food Centre runs a weekly Fresh Market, where fresh fruit, vegetables, and snacks, are sold to students in a central location at reduced prices. In addition to the fresh items, the market also includes non-perishable items such as spices, pasta, and lentils. This program helps students make smart, healthy, eating decisions at a price they can afford.

The centre also organizes Trick or Eat, which takes place on Halloween night. The event collects non-perishable food items for the Saskatoon Food Bank. The event was a success this year with over 2000 lbs of food collected by dozens of student volunteers.

Help Centre

The Help Centre is committed to providing information, referrals, and personal support to students. They offer an exam file, free condoms, free hygiene products, a kitchenette, maps, information on a variety of topics, friendly faces, a positive space, and provide support and community to students. The Help Centre, Peer Support program, offers support and referrals regarding sexual health, academic issues, suicide, pregnancy, and other student issues. They are available by appointment and on a walk-in basis during centre hours.

The Help Centre hosts/participates in major events throughout the year including Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training, Mental Health Support Group, and Mental Health Awareness Week.

This past year was the first year that the centre was located on the main floor of the Memorial Union Building. The new space proved very welcoming to students and provided a great atmosphere for the programs and services offered by the centre. It was also the first year that students could access the exam file via a computer on the main floor of Place Riel. This improved location provided unprecedented access to exams, which led to record usage for the service.

Pride Centre

The Pride Centre is a welcoming and celebratory campus community. The centre provides a friendly environment with a diverse group of people of all sexual orientations and gender identities in an open and progressive environment that advocates, celebrates, and affirms sexual and gender diversity.

The Pride Centre supplies information on safe sex, as well as free condoms, latex gloves, dental dams, and female condoms. The centre also organizes and offers information on local and national Queer news, community organizations, and community events. Some of the key events planned for the centre include Queerapalooza, Ally Week, Asexuality Awareness Week, Transgender Day of Remembrance, and Carnival of Sex.

Women's Centre

The Women's Centre is a safe, dynamic, comfortable, positive space to organize around feminism. This welcoming area located on the main floor of the Memorial Union Building has ample space for resources, discussion groups, and events that served the campus community.

The USSU Women's Centre continues to take a positive and proactive approach to educating and informing the campus community about issues affecting women. The centre strives to provide a safe and positive environment to promote equality while recognizing and celebrating differences within our diverse and dynamic community.

The Women's Centre hosts/participates in major events throughout the year including Take Back the Night, Sexual Assault Awareness Week, Who Needs Feminism?, The National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women, and International Women's Day.

Students’ Union
The Student’ Union fee is used to fund advocacy work and services.

Health and Dental Plan
The USSU Health & Dental Plan provides a comprehensive package of health, dental, vision and travel benefits to fill the gaps left by provincial Medicare and a parent or spouse’s plan.

Student Infrastructure Fee
In March 2003 students voted to implement the Student Infrastructure Fee for the purpose of constructing and sustaining student buildings. Primarily this fee will repay the loan acquired for a 22 million dollar renovation and expansion of Place Riel Student Centre.

U-PASS
Undergraduate students (some exemptions apply) are assessed a mandatory fee of \$76.33 per academic term providing transit coverage from September though December for Term 1, and January through April for Term 2. U-PASS does not include the summer period of May through August. U-PASS allows students unfettered access to Saskatoon Transit services and it is a significant part of the USSU’s commitment to sustainability.
